PA House of Representatives "One Librarian Per School Building" Bill

Contact your state Representative to sign the co-sponsorship memoranda "*One Certified Librarian Per Public School*" being circulated by <u>Rep. Mark Longietti</u> and <u>Rep. Thomas Murt.</u>

With enough support, the bill will be introduced in the PA House this spring. The bill will require state-certified school librarians in every public school in Pennsylvania.

Talking Points:

- All students deserve access to quality resources and instruction that a school library program with a certified librarian provides, not just those who live in a wealthy zipcode.
- School librarians teach students to evaluate information that they read, see or view, learning how to distinguish reliable and trustworthy information from misinformation and fake news.
- School librarians don't just read stories and check out books, they are teachers who
 teach skills mandated in Pennsylvania Academic Core Standards, contributing to
 higher graduation rates.
- Prison libraries are required to have certified librarians in Pennsylvania, but not our public schools.
- School librarians and library programs can close the achievement gap among struggling learners. According to a <u>2012 study of Pennsylvania reading and writing</u> <u>test scores</u>, we know that students who are poor, black, and Hispanic benefit proportionally more than students generally when they have a full-time certified librarian than those who don't.
